When I was in high school, the musical RENT was all the rage. "Seasons of Love" was one of the most moving songs in the musical, asking the question: "how do you measure a year?"

Five hundred twenty-five thousand six hundred minutes How do you measure, measure a year? In daylights, in sunsets, in midnights, in cups of coffee, in inches, in miles, in laughter, in strife In five hundred twenty-five thousand six hundred minutes, how do you measure a year in the life? How about love?

As I'm writing this last Pastor's Report, I have 27 days left at Pilgrim Church. In the midst of the packing, arrangements being made, and the upcoming move, I've been contemplating how I can adequately measure my ministry here among you. I keep a Pastoral Records Book, so I could measure my ministry by noting the following: 14 Baptisms, 18 Confirmands received as full members of the Church, 5 Weddings, 19 Memorial Services/Funerals and Committals, 226 sermons (230 by April 30th!) performed while serving as your pastor. These acts of ministry could help me measure my time in Lexington. But I think I'll stick with the sentiment expressed in RENT by measuring my ministry in love if you will! After all, how can numbers ever adequately capture what those moments in someone's life meant for me blessing people on behalf of the Church? Or for the couple married or someone honoring the life of a loved one or witnessing a baptism or confirmation or being inspired by a sermon? In the end, I'm incredibly grateful to all of you who supported me, encouraged me, and helped me grow as I began my ministry among you at 25 right out of Seminary. I am excited about the future and feel well-prepared to serve the next congregation on my own journey--thanks in large part to the experiences at Pilgrim. Thank you.

Saying goodbye isn't easy, though I know that God is with you and that God is with me in these times of transition. That's where the comfort lies. The United Church of Christ has rules concerning pastoral boundaries of the departing pastor that I will be observing for the good of all. Beginning on May 1 for instance, I will no longer be connected with any Pilgrims on Facebook and will be observing the following to the best of my ability:

It is the expectation that "[u]pon departure, [a] pastor will not return to serve the congregation nor serve members of the congregation in a pastoral capacity. For a minimum of one year up to three years, a minister will observe a no-contact boundary with congregants and will teach congregants to observe the same. This enables the past minister to fulfill the ministerial code of ethics, in support of the congregation's relationship-building with a new minister."¹

Looking forward to celebrating one last Holy Week with all of you before I leave. Hope to see you in church!

Sometimes called "keeping the daily offices" or "observing the divine hours," fixed-hour prayer (alongside honoring the Sabbath and celebrating Communion) is among the oldest and most authentic forms of Christian spiritual practice we have in our tradition. Come to pray, hear beautiful organ pieces, and receive Communion in our candlelit sanctuary. All are welcome, and that means you. Tonight marks the final Lenten Vespers Service. The service begins at 7 pm. We hope to see you there.



UPCOMING LENTEN WORSHIP SERVICES

<u>Sunday April 9th Palm Sunday—10:30 AM.</u> Jesus is welcomed into Jerusalem with folks waving palms and crying, "*Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!*" (John 12:13) This intergenerational service begins as we process into the sanctuary waving our palms to begin Palm Sunday.

Thursday April 13th Maundy Thursday—7:30 PM. Maundy Thursday marks the night Jesus gave the disciples a new commandment, *"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34)* The Last Supper took place on Maundy Thursday and ends with the arrest of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. (Communion will be served.)

Friday April 14th Good Friday Stations of the Cross —12:00 PM. Jesus' journey to the cross, from the time of his arrest and trial to his crucifixion, are the events that help us observe Good Friday. Good Friday is also the day that the Church intercedes for the world, knowing that sin and death never have the final say in God's story. "*Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise*." (*Luke 23:43*)

LEXINGTON INTERFAITH GARDEN NEWS

There is a balm in Gilead, and there is a garden in Lexington, that many folks find is a balm to the spirit. It is in Lexington center behind a farmhouse opposite the Battle Green. There is a barn, and near the barn is the garden which was tended by Carla Fortmann for 30 years to provide food for her family. Now the garden is tended by an interfaith group of people; this is the eighth year of the Interfaith Garden, sponsored by the Interfaith Clergy Association of Lexington.

Each congregation has a liaison who signs up people who want to work at the garden on a Tuesday afternoon (4:30 pm to 6:00 pm) or a Saturday morning from 9 am to 10:30 am. As the plants grow and produce vegetables, the start time on Saturday is earlier so that the veggies can be harvested and wheeled over to the Lexington Food Pantry at Church of our Redeemer, where they are available for people in need.

The work at the garden was delayed this year by the big storm in mid-March, but will start soon. We already have 5 dates assigned to Pilgrim between now and July. CHURCH-WIDE BIBLE READING PROJECT

Each week, I have had copies of the Children's StoryBook Bible available for you to take home and borrow with a sheet that includes discussion questions and activities to consider during the week as time allows for you and yours. April will be our final month of this Church-wide Bible Reading Project. As we think about the Easter story and learn more about the stories that are a part of Holy Week, too, we will have so much to think about. We do not often get to think about the events of Holy Week through a child's eyes! This week, we will read all about the story of Palm Sunday when Jesus enters Jerusalem. We learn that Jesus rode on a donkey into town and many people began waving palms, lining the streets to welcome him and his disciples. We will think about what it would have been like to be different characters in the story. The story we will be reading appears in several places in Christian Testament: Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-14, Luke 19:28-40, and John 12:12-15. Wondering Questions for All

Why do you think Jesus rode into Jerusalem? Why do you think this story was important? (Extra Challenge: There is a lot to research on the web; a good place to start would be resources like www.textweek.com.)

How do you think the disciples felt? What about the person in the neighboring town who was asked by the disciples for Jesus to borrow a donkey? Do you think they knew this person? Why? How do you think the people experiencing the parade felt? How would you feel experiencing this parade? If you saw Jesus, what would you do?

This Week's Challenge

During coffee hour or throughout the week, reach out to another church member or family and talk about any parade experiences you might have. Share a story of a parade and talk about why it is important. Why do we have parades? What sort of parades do we have? Are they just meant to be fun?




