A NOTE FROM REV. KAREN GALE

Dear Pilgrim folks,

Christ is risen! Hallelujah.

Easter season is here. We traveled through the introspective, contemplative season of repentance, of Lent. We've emerged into the light, the hope, the renewal of Easter. I do feel a renewing spirit at Pilgrim. I wonder if you do, too? It was visible to me throughout Holy Week with the great participation of folks helping with Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Easter. It was visible in the hope-filled sanctuary on Easter morning where we welcomed newcomers, traveling family members and regular Pilgrims alike. It is visible in the many different volunteers helping with church school, the hosting of #Lexingtonsaysenough and the welcoming of folks from Open Table Dinner Ministry this coming Sunday. We see gradual resurrection around us.

This is also part of the Interim process. As we do the hard work of:

- looking at ourselves and our ways of being
- questioning what we do and how we do it
- seeking to become a more healthy community of faith

We see things bloom in our midst. There is always further to go and more work to do, but we can see hope return and new ministry ideas and efforts spring forth. We can see where the Interim time is leading us. We strive to become the loving, healthy, resilient and mission-oriented faith community that offers hope and change to our neighbors near and far. We work to heal our past fractures and lean into new practices so that a settled pastor can come partner with a community working to follow Jesus in how we treat one another and how we reach out to the hurting.

We have a busy spring ahead of us. We will mark Earth Day with an earth-action activity and postcard writing campaign. We will celebrate Children's Sunday on Pentecost where our youngest lead us in worship and give us new ways of seeing the Holy. We have four confirmation students who will share with us their journey of faith across these past months. We celebrate Music Appreciation and Graduation. There are so many joyous occasions coming up. There are so many ways to thank God for what is happening at Pilgrim.

In this Easter season, be on the lookout for signs of resurrection that you see at Pilgrim. Take a moment to notice in worship. Take time to look around at Coffee Hour at the intergenerational conversations going on. Look around and see a person you may not have seen in a while or that has newly become part of our community of faith. Then, take time to thank God for all the Pilgrim brings to your life and all the ways Pilgrim touches others' lives. Then, mindful that Jesus is always calling us forward, consider what might be next. What is next for Pilgrim in its journey of healing and wholeness? What is next for you in your faith exploration? OPEN TABLE DINNER CHURCH

On Sunday, April 8th, Co-Pastors Megan Snell, Mel Pace, and ministry intern Nancy Wichmann will be joining us in worship to share a Mission Moment. Together, they will share a bit about the church community they created two years ago called Open Table Dinner Church. Earlier this year, our Mission Team chose to donate to them to help them meet their goal for a matching grant. Up to \$10,000, every dollar donated was tripled by the grant from the United Church of Christ.

Open Table Dinner Church is an emerging ministry of the Metropolitan Community Churches and the United Church of Christ. The church gathers together to eat dinner, celebrate communion, swap stories, read scripture, reflect, pray, and sing. This is how they worship together in order to encourage and empower each person to seek justice in the world through activism.

#LEXINGTONSAYSENOUGH - Sunday, April 8 – Temple Emunah

The mission ministry of Pilgrim Church has agreed to co-sponsor the Follen Church gun violence prevention and healing forum on **Sunday, April 8 from 3 -4:30pm at Temple Emunah – 9 Piper Rd., Lexington.**

The LHS group (#LexingtonSaysEnough) promoting safe schools, is a co-sponsor of the program. Existing gun safety laws will be presented along with the work of the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute (<u>http://www.ldbpeaceinstitute.org)</u>.

There will be four panelists: Emily Weinberg, founder of the LHS student group, Attorney General Maura Healey, Chaplain Clementina Chery, President of the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute, and Rev. Claire Feingold Thoryn, minister of the Follen Church (moderator). Each panelist will speak for 10 minutes, followed by a period for questions.

[Information for those attending the Forum on April 8 at Temple Emunah, 9 Piper Rd., Lexington, 3:00-4:30 pm: We expect a crowd, so consider carpooling. There are 180 parking spaces in the main lot at the Temple (at the end of Piper Rd.). Handicapped parking is to the right of the building. Overflow parking needs to be either on Waltham St., or Concord Road where people can walk to the back right end of April Lane (Minuteman Condos) and take a short path to the Temple. There is no parking on Piper Road. There will be a traffic control officer at the beginning of Piper Rd. The doors of the Temple will open at 2:00 pm.
