I am thrilled to tell you about a new worship opportunity this month in the form of a **Candlelight Communion Christmas Eve Service (Monday December 24<sup>th</sup> 7-8 PM)** and answer some questions you may have.

### Why have a second service?

Some of you adore the Intergenerational Christmas pageant. To you, this is what Christmas at Pilgrim Church is all about. Others are not such big fans and would like to experience something different. Adding a second service seems like a no-brainer to me. For those who love the Pageant, it will be the same as always. For those who want something new and different, you'll have it!

### What will the Candlelight Communion Service be like, is it kid friendly?

It will be a more contemplative service. Lessons, Carols, Candlelight, and Communion—but the children and youth of our church are *always* welcome at any service, this one is no exception to our radical hospitality.

### But our Christmas tradition will change! This is mass chaos!

We are setting up Christmas Eve to be an evening of fellowship, peace, and love. The Pageant service will be held from 5-6 PM, from 6-7 PM there will be a time of fellowship (picture a mini coffee hour with Christmas cookies), and from 7-8 PM we will hold our Candlelight Communion Service. You and/or your family are invited to be here the entire time! After all, these will be two very different Christmas Eve services with fellowship in between. Just want to go to the Pageant? Great. Stay for cookies and then head home. Just want to go to the Candlelight Communion Service? Fabulous. Come a little early for cookies and then worship with us at 7. Want to attend both? Wonderful! You can spend the evening with your Pilgrim family and be home by shortly after 8, what could be better? If you would rather not come to the new Candlelight Communion Service, you don't have to. I hope all will be respectful, kind, and positive as we try something new as a congregation.

### Finally, Communion on Christmas Eve?

Yes! Communion on Christmas Eve is a time-honored tradition in the Christian faith. Don't take my word for it, here's what some worship experts have to say, "The candlelight service and the Christmas Eve Holy Communion have special appeal to Christians because of the environment of the night solemnity, the lights shining in the darkness, and the glorious range of music associated with the biblical themes."

I would like the chance to offer our Sacrament of Communion on two of the most holy days in our tradition—Christmas and Easter. Communion on Christmas Eve is a chance for us to gather around Christ's table and experience a profound sense of community. Finally, having experienced the sacredness of Communion on Christmas Eve with previous churches I have been privileged to attend and serve, I am excited to offer this worship experience here at Pilgrim.

### **NOVEMBER COUNCIL HAPPENINGS**

The following is a summary of our November Council meeting:

Treasurer's Report – Our Treasurer, Dave McClave, prepares monthly financial reports for both our Finance and Administration Committee and Church Council. At each Council meeting, members have an opportunity to ask our Treasurer questions regarding these reports and any other financial matters affecting Pilgrim.

**Stewardship Report** – David Nuss, the Chair of our Stewardship Committee, provided an update on this year's Stewardship Campaign.

**Christmas Party** – Acting upon a request from the Fellowship Committee, Council approved serving wine at this year's Christmas Party.

Coffee Hour – Council discussed our new program of inviting members and friends to host Coffee Hour on a specified date. Acting upon a request from the Fellowship Committee, Council approved a back-up plan for those times when the scheduled members/friends are unable to host

**Sale of Investment Shares** – Acting upon a request from our Treasurer, Council approved the sale of certain investment shares held by the Equipping the Saints Fund to ensure sufficient liquidity for the Fund.

Guidelines for Political Activity— Council approved the following guidelines regarding political activity at Pilgrim: Church-wide requests for signing petitions or letter writing of a political nature directed at an individual politician or a particular political party are not permitted. All other church-wide requests for signing petitions or letter writing of a political nature require the prior approval of Council.

Implementing the Vision – As its last order of business, Council discussed the feedback received at the Implementing the Vision program and how to best utilize that information as we plan for the upcoming year.

### WOULD YOU CONSIDER BEING PILGRIM'S NEXT COLLECTOR?

I have been your Collector since 2003 and I would like to recruit and train my replacement. The duties of the Collector:

All incoming money is passed through the Collector. This would include pledges, cash donated as part of the offering, mission collections and a multitude or other items such as: payment for pumpkins and altar flowers, silent auction proceeds, the barbeque, etc.

The accounting function, done weekly, is to take these diverse donations and payments and update the records of each donor. This works pretty smoothly using a simple database program on a PC. It takes me about 10 minutes to do for a summer service and about an hour and a half at Easter - with most Sundays being about an hour.

The final step is to take the money to Pilgrim's bank and let the Treasurer (Dave McClave) know the details.

Individual pledges are confidential and the Collector and the Pastor are the only two individuals with access to this information.

Therefore the Collector has a secondary function of assisting with the annual stewardship campaign.

I think that the two most important qualities for a Collector are discretion (with respect to the individual pledge information) and attention to detail. If you are interested please contact me at derek.gardiner.02420@gmail.com. We can have a chat and I can explain more and answer your questions.

### **ZAMBIA CWB SUMMER 2013 TRIP**

Dear Covenant Partners.

The United Church of Christ, throughout its history and the shared histories of our predecessor bodies, has shown clear commitments to racial justice and equality. As Conference Ministers we feel compelled to speak out at this moment in time.

Our ancestors in faith led the movement for abolition. They were a voice of reason at the dawn of Reconstruction, when America attempted to rebuild a nation buttressed by white power and privilege. They fought long and hard during the time of Jim Crow to gain new ground in the equality of all races. They fought to end red-lining districts that forced black families into ghettoes. And they walked arm in arm with our brothers and sisters of color during the Civil Rights movement.

They were willing to be jailed, persecuted, ridiculed, and even at times martyred for the cause of racial justice and equality.

Our own commitments to this movement of equality for all races are now being put to the test. In the days following the re-election of this nation's first black president, there are painful reminders of how pernicious the evils of white power, white privilege, and white supremacy remain in this great land of ours. And now is not the time for those who see with new eyes the fresh face of a richer, more diverse people to be silent. We must also let our practice and behavior reflect our commitment, by constantly examining ourselves lest we fall prey. (2Cor. 13:5)

Like the women and men who in previous times found their courage, their voice, their call to action – so must we now find ours as well. Let us hear again, and be inspired by, the words of the great abolitionist poet James Russell Lowell, who in "The Present Crisis" wrote:

"New occasions teach new duties; Time makes ancient good uncouth; They must upward still, and onward, who would keep abreast of Truth."



Long before white men once again claim by divine right a privileged place at the expense of all others; and long before America loses the forward momentum gained in her great and interminable struggle with racial equality; and realizing that, though momentum has been gained and big steps taken toward racial justice, there is yet more light and truth to break forth in this ongoing struggle for equality: let us in this day renew our commitment to the struggle for racial justice and equality. Let us awaken to the new threats that are emerging in these days to this embrace of equality. Let us not be daunted by the long, hard road – but be invigorated by the gains made, emboldened by the costs paid already by true disciples, and energized by the promise of a vision of Shalom that many of us can see on the horizon of this new day.

We call on all settings of the church to maintain a vigilant voice in this struggle for racial justice and equality. We invite you to engage once again in Sacred Conversations on Race that open new doors for new understandings about race, prejudice, and privilege. We urge you to speak out when voices emerge on the landscape that threatens to turn back the clock and undo the work of those who came before us. We invite our white members, families, and churches to develop new skills as allies in dismantling white privilege and fostering new dimensions of racial justice and equality. We call upon preachers to find their voice and speak out when local and national leaders reclaim the old language of white power and privilege. And we invite us all to be in fervent prayer for that hoped-for day when all "will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."
