As our Annual Meeting approaches, and I reflected on the various things we've done together in my Pastor's Report, I feel excited. We've had a great year so far. It's been a year of transitions, of beginnings and endings, but I sense excitement and hope when we're together on Sunday mornings and when we perform the business of the church as the body of Christ.

When we are trying to be the Church in 2012, too often we hear solely about the decline of Mainline Protestant churches, our denomination, the UCC included. We hear, or at least I do in my ministerial circles, that our pews are empty, our people are not committing (by joining our churches and/or financially contributing to the mission of our churches), and the whole institutional church can feel a little lack luster. We live in an age where people proclaim that they are spiritual but not religious—where many people doubt the merits of organized religion in the first place. Actually, in a 2009 Gallup Poll, Massachusetts was listed as the third least religious state in the country. And I often wonder what to do with information like that. Truthfully, I read all of these statistics and have conversations with people, and I start to feel a little overwhelmed. What should being the Church in 2012 even look like?

But then I see all of you in worship on Sunday mornings, and I take heart. We are doing something important together—we are worshiping God as a gathered community and we are trying to live out our faiths day by day. We have a particular faith perspective at Pilgrim Church and in the United Church of Christ, of radical hospitality and loving God by loving others that I believe our world desperately needs to hear, maybe now more than ever. This is important and good and noteworthy and worth celebrating, and there is so much life here at Pilgrim Church!

We are a church committed to mission and helping people all around the world. We are a church with open doors and open hearts, and that's shown by welcoming people when they come into our church and having a smile on our faces when we are trying to get people to buy one more pumpkin or book to support Honduras or sign the guest book so we can send them a letter of welcome even if they just wanted to stop in for the day.

Maybe people would look at the statistics and not see much difference, but you'll notice in the Annual Report that our attendance has gone up, from 98 people in worship on average last year to 109 people this year. Who cares, some may think, that's only 11 more people. But I think that for a church our size, that's saying something. On Christmas Eve there were 313 people here, and that's also worth celebrating. I don't want to steal anyone's thunder by announcing our Stewardship numbers as of right now, but we did remarkably well. Pilgrims supported the church with generous hearts, and you all were truly cheerful givers. The point is, we have a lot to be thankful for and celebrate as we go into our Annual Meeting on February 5th.

(John 13: 34) Maundy Thursday is also the night of the Last Supper and ends with the arrest of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. (Communion will be served this night.)



Friday April 6<sup>th</sup> Good Friday—7:30 pm. Jesus' journey to the cross, from the time of his arrest and trial to his crucifixion, are the events that help us observe Good Friday. Good Friday is also historically the day that the Church

intercedes for the world, knowing that sin and death are not the end of our story or God's story.

#### HOW HOMELESSNESS HURTS CHILDREN'S HEALTH AND HOW YOU CAN HELP

Eighth Annual Interfaith Homelessness Forum Sunday, March 11, 2012, 3:00-5:00pm, Trinity Episcopal Church, 81 Elm St., Concord

Family homelessness remains a severe problem in Massachusetts. Over 42,000 families sought state housing assistance in the year ending July 2011, 30% more than in 2010. Expectant women experiencing homelessness are 30% more likely to deliver pre-term and 50% more likely to have low-weight babies. Children living without permanent housing are 70% more likely to have developmental delays and 50% more likely to be in poor health than children who enjoy stable housing.

Learn what we can do to protect children's health by sustaining the state's successful Homelessness Prevention Program NOW AT RISK due to limits in state budget funding.

Speakers will be Dr. Megan Sandel, Associate Professor of Pediatrics and Public Health at Boston Medical Center and a nationally recognized expert on housing and child health; Robert Pulster, Associate Director, Department of Housing Stabilization, Mass. Department of Housing and Community Development; a formerly homeless mother; and a panel of area state legislators. The forum, organized by the Advocacy Network to End Family Homelessness, is free and open to all.

A big round of applause goes to Ruth who continues to bring in funding for our Zambia mission work.



#### **HONDURAS HAPPENINGS**

On January 30th I will be returning to Honduras for a six week visit. Tom, Claire and Don Moir will be joining me on February 11th, and my son Ricky and his friend, Laua Sierra, will be arriving on February 19th. We're really looking forward to sharing the Honduran experience with others and learning from their insight and perspectives.

We will be working collaboratively in medical clinics in Flores, nearby La Paz and in the mountains with a large group of volunteers from Michigan. Also, we will be hosting a dentist from Florida who will be conducting four days of dental clinics in our home.

The Honduran Support Group just approved designating the funds we received from "The Longest Night" service to be used for improvements to the public hospital in Comayagua. This hospital is in deplorable condition...structurally it is falling apart, and it lacks basic medical equipment. Our initial concentration will be in the neonatal ward where 6,000 babies (including ones from Flores) are delivered each year.

Tom and I look forward to meeting with representatives from PLAN Honduras and Flores' water committee to get an update on the technical study of the water project which is currently under way.

We look forward to seeing patients who are currently being treated within country, and the others who are waiting our arrival. Certainly, we appreciate your continued prayers and support. You're in my thoughts as I pack many donations which you have generously provided...


PILGRIM ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP

With actions over the summer and fall, they have delayed or perhaps stopped the development of another oil pipeline across fragile ecosystems of the United States to Texas refineries. We can be grateful to people who risked and endured arrest or surrounded the White House in peaceful dissent.

These successful actions made me wonder what we can do to share in the work of energy conservation and ecosystem preservation? Jim Antal has the answer: another carbon fast. The proceeds of this year's sale will be dedicated to creating improvements in the Labor and Delivery/ Gynecology room of the Hospital Santa Teresa in Comayagua, Honduras the nearest hospital to Flores.

In just that department (which is essentially one room) of the hospital there are falling ceiling tiles, exposed wires, blood stained floors, crowded conditions with no privacy, and virtually no medical equipment. For example, what passes for an incubator is a tiny bed with a desk lamp over it to provide heat. With your help, a big difference can be created in this one room of one hospital!

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## How Homelessness Hurts Children's Health and How You Can Help

Eighth Annual Forum on Family Homelessness Sunday, March 11, 2012, 3:00-5:00 PM Trinity Episcopal Church, 81 Elm St., Concord.

Sponsors: Advocacy Network to End Family Homelessness, Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries (CMM), and Horizons for Homeless Children. Co-sponsors: Episcopal City Mission and UU Mass Action Network

Family homelessness remains at very high levels in Mass. due to the continued difficult economy, including record foreclosures. Over 42,000 families sought state housing assistance in the year ending July 2011 - 30% more than in 2010. Currently, over 2000 families are in shelters nightly plus more than 1300 families are still in motels, placing at great risk the health of families and children.

This year's Forum focuses on the impact of homelessness on children's health.

- Expectant women experiencing homelessness are 30% more likely to have pre-term deliveries, and 50% more likely to deliver low weight infants.
- Children in housing insecurity are 50% more likely to be in poor health, and 70% more at risk of developmental problems.
