#### **DECEMBER**

The following is a summary of our December Council meeting:

Website Presentation – Jeanne DeSanto made a presentation to Council regarding the design and implementation of a new website as part of a broader branding and communications update for the church. Council unanimously supported moving ahead with this project. A small working group will be created and they will present next steps to Council.

**Treasurer's Report** – Dave McClave presented the monthly financial reports. It is anticipated that we will end the year with a significant operating surplus due mostly to lower than expected operating expenses.

**Stewardship Report** – David Nuss, the Chair of our Stewardship Committee, provided an update on this year's Stewardship Campaign. Subsequent to the meeting, it was reported that we had met our stewardship goal.

Election Committee – Council approved the following persons serving on the Election Committee for the 2013 Council elections: Jim Munkres (Chair), Tom Murphy and Marge Saradjian.

Collector and Assistant Collector – Acting upon a recommendation from the Finance and Administration Committee, Council approved Susan Carabbio serving as our new Collector and Derek Gardiner serving in the newly-created position of Assistant Collector. Susan and Derek will assume their new positions in March.

**Annual Meeting and Annual Report** – Council set February 3, 2013 as the date for the Annual Meeting. Committee reports are due to Diane Blair

no later than January 18<sup>th</sup> for compilation in the Annual Report which will be made available to the congregation by January 25<sup>th</sup>. Any committee reports not received by January 18<sup>th</sup> will not be included in the Annual Report but will be made available separately as they are received.

The **Youth Support Committee** is a group of your fellow Pilgrims who support Dana Ellis, our Director of Youth Ministry. The committee began as an Ad Hoc Search Committee in response to our congregation ranking the need for youth ministry among the highest priorities for our congregation during the 2010 Visioning process.

The Committee initially surveyed about 25 local UCC congregations to determine how other congregations organize their youth ministry and to identify some best practices. Armed with that knowledge, the committee wrote a job description, advertised the Youth Minister position, and interviewed qualified applicants. The search portion of our work ended with the hiring of Dana Ellis as our first paid Director of Youth Ministry in January 2011.

Since Dana started, the Search Committee has become the Youth Support Committee. We meet as needed during the school year to support Dana in her ministry. We help with scheduling; recruit chaperones; make announcements; help set goals; survey parents; and provide feedback on particular events as well as on Dana's overall performance. Dana's programming consists of a mix of both

fellowship and mission experiences. The initial Youth Group consisted of a mix of Junior and Senior High Youth. For the 2012-2013 school year, Dana started 2 separate Youth Groups: Junior High and Senior High. There are still certain events that include both the Junior and Senior High Youth Groups. A first this year will be a Mission Trip to the Washington, DC area during April vacation for the Senior High Youth.

The current Youth Support Committee is **Jeff Boehm, Lisa Boehm, Sharon Lawler and Kat MacDonald.** Rev. Lauren Lorincz is an ex officio member and is with us at all the meetings. Jeff Boehm is both a member of the committee and also our representative to Council. Our committee operates without a chairperson.

As some of you know, Pilgrim Church will be installing a new heating system this summer. It will be more efficient and provide cost-savings for the future. My colleagues on Church Council have requested that I lead a special fundraising initiative for this new system. The total cost will be about 150K and my goal is to raise 40-60K. The remaining cost will be covered by our church reserves, which are stronger than in the past due to some real estate transactions and the income from the cell tower. I am confident that we will succeed, and every dollar raised beyond our goal will keep our reserves in that much better shape for the future.

I will formally announce this special fundraising initiative on January 13th, and hope to have all pledges completed by the end of the month. Pledges can be paid over two years and are fully tax-deductible. During recent weeks, I have been engaged in leading the quiet phase of this effort, speaking with a few Pilgrims and all members of Church Council. I am delighted to report that we already have a number of pledges, enabling us to begin with good progress toward our goal of 40-60K. I thank all of you who have made a pledge already, and look forward to asking the entire congregation for your participation in 2013!

### PILGRIM ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP – A BOOK REVIEW

As we start the new year, let's keep in mind that many people are working diligently to solve the environmental problems our world faces. Dave McClave has reviewed a book by two people who have been thinking outside the box for many years. We can be encouraged by what they have to say. If you are intrigued by Dave's review, you'll find a copy of "Cradle to Cradle" on the Environmental Book Shelf which is on a table just inside the main front door at Pilgrim Church.

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"Cradle to Cradle: Remaking the Way We Make Things"

William McDonough and Michael Braungart (2002)

You may think it's odd to review a book that was first published ten years ago, but it is a great book that is not widely known. The authors — McDonough and Braungart — are an architect and industrial chemist respectively and they are certainly not the usual pairing for writing a book in the "environment" or "ecology" categories. The book itself is not a usual book: it weighs about three times what you'd expect and the pages don't feel like paper. In fact, the Introduction is titled "This Book Is Not A Tree," and in it the authors explain that the book is made from plastic resins and inorganic fillers and is designed to be infinitely broken down and recycled in industrial processes.

The overarching theme of the book is that humans are not to blame for consuming things. Every

creature on earth consumes something. The problem is that humans, unlike all the other inhabitants of Earth, make and consume things that are not designed to be safely returned to the earth. Thus the real problem is one of design. From this concept flows other ideas: everyone is "downstream;" one size rarely fits all; respect diversity; turn consumers into customers; waste equals food; and (my favorite) less bad does not equal good.

Whether you are an avid environmentalist or just plain curious about some of the concepts noted above, I think you'll find this book an excellent read. (Just in case you find this book as fascinating as I do, you will be happy to know that Mr. McDonough is coming out with a new book in April 2013 titled "Upcycled." It should be interesting.)

## FROM THE MISSION COMMITTEE BRISTOL LODGE

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink. (Matthew 25:35) For 25 years, Pilgrim Church has been providing and serving a meal on the second Thursday of every month at Bristol Lodge in Waltham, MA. If you pour yourself out for the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then shall your light rise in the darkness and your gloom be as the noonday. (Isaiah 58:10) Originally members used to meet at the church on Thursday afternoon, prepare a meal, bring it over and serve it Bristol Lodge. Then we shifted to people signing up to bring food and/or to serve. Our current commitment is to provide a meal for 80-100 people every second Thursday of the month at 4:30-6 pm at the facility in Waltham. At a minimum we need people to donate and/or purchase the food and then 2 people to serve at Bristol Lodge on that night.

Reimbursement from the Mission budget can be made when receipts are given to the church treasurer (Dave McClave).

The Mission Committee has reviewed and considered the feedback received from the Implementing the Vision meeting held on November 4, 2012. At that meeting, members of the church indicated an interest for mission to be a beacon of light in the areas of social justice including homelessness/hunger and serving populations marginalized by society. Bristol Lodge services this population. Most, if not all, of the clients looking to get a hot meal at Bristol Lodge (probably their only hot meal that day) are homeless or part of the working poor. Whoever oppresses a poor man insults his Maker, but he who is generous to the needy honors him. (Proverbs) We know that there is an interest from the congregation in participating in family mission activities. Serving at Bristol Lodge is a rewarding experience for families with children at elementary school level or above. For families with younger children, older children or no children, the shopping and dropping off of food at the Pilgrim kitchen for Bristol Lodge is a chance to rejoice in the Lord's blessings and a chance to share those blessings with the less fortunate.

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? (James) We believe that you want Mission to continue with this good work -- we just need a little help to keep it going. We are asking members within the general congregation to commit to being a cocaptain of a Bristol Lodge Thursday. We only need 24 people a year to do that. Just 2 people to be responsible for a specific month. From the general comments at the Vision meeting, we believe that this mission falls within the goals and interests of the general congregation. We would appreciate your feedback on what can be done to make this mission easier to access such as electronic sign-ups or changes to the menu. If the congregation is interested in continuing with Bristol Lodge, we can come up with and are open to ideas to make it easier. We just need your affirmation and support to continue with this mission.

# MACUCC STAFF JOIN NATIONAL LEADERS IN LETTER ON RACISM

On rare occasions, the leaders of our denomination write a pastoral letter to the church. In this case, it comes from the Conference Ministers. It is prompted by the racist comments and behaviors that have been in the news before, during and after the national election. Another Conference Minister said it well: "I believe we are in one of those moments of American culture when it is appropriate to be reminded of what it takes to be the best people God means us to be in America." Dear Covenant Partners,

The United Church of Christ, throughout its history and the shared histories of our predecessor bodies, has shown clear commitments to racial justice and equality. As Conference Ministers we feel compelled to speak out at this moment in time.

Our ancestors in faith led the movement for abolition. They were a voice of reason at the dawn of Reconstruction, when America attempted to rebuild a nation buttressed by white power and privilege. They fought long and hard during the time of Jim Crow to gain new ground in the equality of all races. They fought to end red-lining districts that forced black families into ghettoes.

And they walked arm in arm with our brothers and sisters of color during the Civil Rights movement.

They were willing to be jailed, persecuted, ridiculed, and even at times martyred for the cause of racial justice and equality.

Our own commitments to this movement of equality for all races are now being put to the test. In the days following the re-election of this nation's first black president, there are painful reminders of how pernicious the evils of white power, white privilege, and white supremacy remain in this great land of ours. And now is not the time for those who see with new eyes the fresh face of a richer, more diverse people to be silent. We must also let our practice and behavior reflect our commitment, by constantly examining ourselves lest we fall prey. (2Cor. 13:5)

Like the women and men who in previous times found their courage, their voice, their call to action – so must we now find ours as well. Let us hear again, and be inspired by, the words of the great abolitionist poet James Russell Lowell, who in "The Present Crisis" wrote:

"New occasions teach new duties; Time makes ancient good uncouth; They must upward still, and onward, who would keep abreast of Truth."

Long before white men once again claim by divine right a privileged place at the expense of all others; and long before America loses the forward momentum gained in her great and interminable struggle with racial equality; and realizing that, though momentum has been gained and big steps taken toward racial justice, there is yet more light and truth to break forth in this ongoing struggle for equality: let us in this day renew our commitment to the struggle for racial justice and equality. Let us awaken to the new threats that are emerging in these days to this embrace of equality. Let us not be daunted by the long, hard road – but be invigorated by the gains made, emboldened by the costs paid already by true disciples, and energized by the promise of a vision of Shalom that many of us can see on the horizon of this new day.

We call on all settings of the church to maintain a vigilant voice in this struggle for racial justice and equality. We invite you to engage once again in Sacred Conversations on Race that open new doors for new understandings about race, prejudice, and privilege. We urge you to speak out when voices emerge on the landscape that threatens to turn back the clock and undo the work of those who came before us. We invite our white members, families, and churches to develop new skills as allies in dismantling white privilege and fostering new dimensions of racial justice and equality. We call upon preachers to find their voice and speak out when local and national leaders reclaim the old language of white power and privilege. And we invite us all to be in fervent prayer for that hopedfor day when all "will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."
