

PILGRIM CHURCH YOUTH FELLOWSHIP

Pilgrim Church Youth Fellowship has had quite a successful start this year! Beginning in January the program has had a regular attendance by many of the Youth at the church. With a philosophy that emphasizes the importance of growing and maintaining an active youth community within the church, Pilgrim Youth fellowship has kept in mind three important tenets essential to growing and maintaining a strong youth presence in the church and with one another. With an emphasis on fellowship and creating a strong bond, worship and spiritual reflection, and giving back to our community through service, Pilgrim Youth Fellowship has been able to cultivate a strong presence at the Church this year. Meeting biweekly, Pilgrim Youth Group has also held many successful events. Some highlights include:

A Lock-In – In April, Pilgrim Church hosted a Lock-In for Junior High youth. At the Lock-In over eleven teens attended and nine teens slept over at the church. We played many games (such as Sardines and the all-time favorite 'Murder in the Dark'), followed by cupcake decorating, prayerful reflection, and finally a movie. That Sunday at the Lock-In the youth hosted coffee hour at the church which featured an array of brightly decorated baked goods decorated from the night before!

Two Fellowship Events – In February Pilgrim Youth went snow tubing at Nashoba Valley! With fourteen

teens in attendance, it was our first and most popular event to date. The second fellowship event, Laser Tag, will be held on June 18th, and promises to be just as exciting!

Volunteering – In late April the Youth at Pilgrim went to the Boston Convention Center to assist in the preparation efforts for Project Bread's Walk for Hunger that was held on Sunday, May 1st. At the convention center seven youth, two chaperones, and myself packed snack bags for the walk, helping to prepare for the walk we packed just some of the 25,000 bags that were needed. Afterwards we walked over to the bakery and café 'Flour' for lunch!

Overall, the Youth Program has received so much generous support from the congregation. Whether it was donating snacks, donating your time through chaperoning, or providing encouragement to the youth regarding all the activities we were doing, feeling the outpouring of enthusiasm and excitement from the congregation for the work I've done here has been nothing short of a blessing and I am excited for all the great things in store for the youth at Pilgrim.

HONDURAS HAPPENINGS

Currently, we have three Honduran patients being treated at Shriners Hospital in Boston. Let me "introduce" you to 13 year old, "Dania." She is here without family, being treated for significant burns. Dania has also endured the traumatic loss of having her long, beautiful hair shaved so that the doctors could use some of that skin for grafting.

Dania is one of 12 children in her family and has never had the opportunity to attend school. She cannot read, write or name colors. What struck me the harshest is hearing others describe, "she's never had the chance to play." Such a shocking reality of life for many growing up in Honduras. Pre-schoolers are active contributors around the house. Older children often work outside the home, doing hard manual labor in order to earn a few "lempiras" (money) for their families. Dania has missed the chance for a childhood because she has been the one in her family who is responsible for cooking.

Dania lives in a very remote part of Honduras. Her father lives hours away because that is the only place he can find work. After Dania was burned, it took him two days to sell his crops and save enough money to hire two men to walk the hour distance on the off beaten path to Dania's home. They carried her in a hammock to an "ambulance" (an empty truck where she had to lay on the metal floor).

Dania was in a public hospital for three months before she deteriorated so badly, the doctors finally gave up, and her only chance for survival was being transferred to the states. In Honduras, when they would do her dressing changes, she would lose so much blood, it would fill a bucket each day.

Upon arrival to Boston, she received several blood transfusions, has gained weight and is making incredible progress. We are grateful to all the staff at Shriners Hospital.
