There is a new committee in our church that I'd like to highlight this month. A few months back, Church Council approved the formation of a **Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC)** to help me (and all of you) continue to have a healthy, open relationship for our mutual ministry. A PRC is vital for ministers and congregations to have a productive, sustainable, supportive, and joyous relationship. When functioning properly, many pastors find them to be indispensible and one of the most helpful aspects of serving in a local church setting.

In a nutshell, the PRC is the place where I can go for support and guidance and for all of you to go to provide feedback and express joys and concerns, particularly if you feel that you may not be able to come directly to me. You, of course, can still come to me with feedback and concerns! However, this is the group that can help me interpret the feedback, hopes, and expectations you express when I need a little help and guidance.

So what does a PRC do? The main functions are:

- 1.) Serve as an advisory group
 - Share ideas, dreams, hopes, expectations, and concerns of the congregation with the pastor
- 2.) Serve as a support group for the pastor's leadership
 - Interprets roles, functions, and needs of the pastor to the congregation

In Peter Steinke's wonderful book, <u>Healthy Congregations</u>: A <u>Systems Approach</u>, he speaks about the importance of having an open system in congregations, where lots of information and new ideas are shared. In order to do that, you have to have "feedback loops," which provide the means for all of us to be on the same page and actually hear this information and the new ideas expressed. Basically, PRCs are an ideal way for churches to have the space to promote healthy communication within often complex congregational systems.

Our Pilgrim Pastoral Relations Committee has three members: **Bob Beckwith (PRC chair), Sylvia Ferrell-Jones,** and **Beth Kurth.** Bob, Sylvia, and Beth were chosen by me in consultation with our former Moderator Marjory German and were approved by Church Council to take on this role in the life of our church. They will serve as an advisory group to the congregation and as a support group for me. We had our first meeting at the beginning of May and will continue to meet monthly throughout the church year.

Going forward, Bob, Sylvia, and Beth will be meeting with me every month to bring your joys and concerns to me, and they will be there to help support my leadership among you. I hope you'll join me in thanking them for taking on this important role in the life of Pilgrim Church, and that you'll feel free to speak with them openly and honestly should you ever feel the need.



WHERE DO PILGRIM'S MISSION DOLLARS GO?

Pilgrim Church has always had a great commitment to mission projects. Members of the Mission Committee meet monthly to plan fund disbursements, monthly Mission Moments, and mission-related events.

The money Pilgrim contributes to mission work comes from 5 main sources:

- Direct appeals to our congregation through specific collections (including the 5 annual UCC Special Collections)
- 2. Income from the cell phone tower in our steeple- a percentage is allocated to mission work (about \$225/month)
- 3. Fundraisers for a specific project for example, the Book Sale, whose proceeds are used to support projects in Flores, Honduras
- 4. Pilgrim's Operating Budget funds a portion of the mission work
- 5. Capital Campaigns –a portion of past capital campaigns have been earmarked for mission

The Mission Committee wants you to know how we have distributed mission funds for the last seven years (the years for which we have easilyaccessible, detailed data).

OTHER WAYS IN WHICH PILGRIMS SUPPORT MISSION WORK

In-kind Donations - Our members make MANY in-kind donations (such as clothing, medical supplies and school supplies to Zambia and Honduras; White Socks and Canned Goods to East End House: Winter Coats to Cradles to Crayons: Christmas "Wish List" gifts to Shriners' patients; and Baked Goods and other food to Bristol Lodge). Mission Trips and Service Projects - Our congregants participate in service projects (Cradles to Crayons, Walk for Hunger); prepare and serve a monthly meal at Bristol Lodge in Waltham; and make mission trips to Zambia and Honduras. **Room at the Table** – Although not a project of Pilgrim Church, many church members help coordinate the twice-yearly Room at the Table (RATT) fundraising events to support various worthy causes. Pilgrim provides the venue as well as many of the volunteers and participants. **Equipping the Saints** – A generous donor established a fund that provides mission and outreach funds for congregants. While these funds do not go through the Mission Committee budget, they are available through grants which may be applied for by any member of Pilgrim Church. This generous gift has enabled many Pilgrims to participate in mission trips and projects.

The Mission Committee is open to any member of the Pilgrim Congregation who is interested.

We are working very hard at collecting supplies to bring with us to Zambia in July. The mission of Communities Without Borders is to educate AIDS orphans and other vulnerable children, primarily in Africa, in order to nourish hope for a better future for them, society and the world. Our approach fosters building ongoing community to community relationships at the grassroots level in order to increase the quality educational opportunities for these children.

We are collecting the following supplies until mid-June. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Tom Murphy, Ruth Litchfield, Lisa & Douglas McIlrath, Jeff & Chloe Boehm and Lauren Lorincz. Empty suitcases are waiting to be filled!

School Supplies: pencils, chalk, crayons, white computer paper (8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11), erasers, and glue sticks.

We are also collecting manipulatives like **legos**, **blocks**, **gears**, **puzzles** (50 pieces or less), decks of cards, beach balls, jump ropes and tennis balls. (Dexter Whittinghill has already spoken to us and is

delivering once again - **thank you**, **Dex!**) Lightly used items are gladly accepted too!



HONDURAS WATER PROJECT UPDATE PROJECT TO BE COMPLETED BY JUNE 30, 2012

As you may know, Pilgrim has partnered with Plan International USA to oversee and implement our water project in Flores, Honduras. Phase I, a technical study of the existing water infrastructure, was completed in March. Based on that study, Plan recommended and our Mission Committee approved funding Phase II of the project which will restore potable water to Flores. The primary work to be done in Phase II includes the following:

- Rehabilitation and improvement of the filtration system
- Construction of a hydro chlorinator
- Reconstruction of the electrical system
- Rehabilitation of the pumping equipment, testing and calibration
- Replacement of sections of the existing piping system
- Flushing the lines and water testing

The cost of the Phase II work is approximately \$11,770. The work is currently expected to be completed by June 30, 2012 and that will bring this project to completion. At a total project cost of approximately \$16,125, Pilgrim Church has made a significant contribution to the people of Flores that will have an immediate and lasting impact on their quality of life.

If you have friends or neighbors who might appreciate an in-person update on the Ticket Week process, please share this information with them. If you know someone who might need assistance, please help them submit a request!


