Narrowing it down to 3 topics was actually easier than I imagined because some were related. Great minds think alike!

Drumroll, please....

POSSIBLE SERMON SERIES TOPICS FOR THE FALL:

1.) Theodicy (the problem of evil)

- The age-old theological question: if God is all good/all loving **and** all powerful/omnipotent, then why is there evil in the world?
- How do we account for bad things happening to good people too?
- And what's up with the Book of Job?

2.) World Religions

- We would hear about the five major world religions—Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, Judaism, and Christianity.
- The sermon on Christianity could focus on what to do with Christian exclusivism in a multi-faith world.

3.) Women in Scripture

- Women in Jesus' ministry, roles women played in famous Bible stories
- Women in Paul's letters—the authentic letters of Paul vs. letters written in Paul's name that tend to limit roles women can play in the Church
- How do we account for patriarchy in some Christian traditions, especially when they cite scripture to make their case?

No matter which topic gets the most votes, I certainly have my work cut out for me. Human beings have been discussing the problem of evil forever! I won't be able to solve this dilemma (unfortunately), but it will be interesting to explore theodicy together. Moreover, in an increasingly connected and small world, figuring out how world religions (and women and men of faith who practice them) relate to one another is imperative like never before. Some religion scholars have even made the claim that religions respecting one another and getting along is the key to world peace. And the role of women in scripture and the Church has been contested and debated for years. So much for easy, lighthearted topics, though I am excited about all of them. Great suggestions!

A NEW WALKWAY

One of the results of the annual visit of the Lexington Building Inspector last year was the information that the

handicapped access ramp leading to the entrance of Pilgrim Hall no longer meets the code requirements. Among other problems, the height differential between the landing and the door jamb is too great for a wheelchair to navigate readily. By law we must meet these requirements.

Many possible solutions were discussed and found wanting. Eventually, it became clear that the old ramp needed to be replaced. But instead of another ramp, larger and with taller side rails, we are going to have a curving sidewalk instead! The walkway will begin next to the lower end of the main sidewalk, then curve around in front of the small maple tree near the Sun Room, and eventually end at a landing in front of the doors to Pilgrim Hall. Because the slope will be very gradual, hand rails will not be required.

The walkway will be more attractive and less expensive than a new ramp would be--a win-win solution to a sticky problem. Plans are in the works to have construction begin this summer.

HEATING SYSTEM UPDATE

I am disheartened to report that we received only one bid on the heating system replacement project, and it was significantly greater than our pre-bid estimate of \$130K. The matter was discussed at F&A and the decision was

made not to accept the bid. A new project team was put in place consisting of Derek Gardiner (lead), Jim Munkres, and Duncan Todd, with me acting as a consultant. The plan is for the team to meet with the bidder to figure out why the bid was so much greater than our professional cost estimate. The information gleaned from this meeting will determine the course moving forward. The goal remains the same - a new heating system. The cost and timing are the variables.

That in March at Lexington's Town Meeting, three 3rd graders spoke up to support one of the warrant articles? Alice Van Evera and two of her friends had been wondering how they could do something to help protect our planet from pollution and global warming. They discussed their plans with Alice's dad, Steve. He suggested they consider supporting one of the Town Warrant Articles, the one that would allow the town to place solar panels on town

buildings. They asked several people how this could be done and then they began their own research. Each of the girls wrote her own statement of why it was important to save energy, and stop polluting. Steve drove them to Town Meeting on the evening that "their" Warrant Article was to be discussed, and introduced them to the Town Meeting Moderator, Deborah Brown. She showed them where they would stand when it was time to speak. At the appointed time they each read their pieces into the microphone in the balcony. When they had finished, they quoted together from The Lorax, a book by Dr. Seuss. It reads:

"Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not."

After that, the Town Meeting burst into applause and gave them a standing ovation (normally not allowed). The warrant article passed unanimously.

THANK YOU TO ALL WHO CONTRIBUTED TO THE SUCCESS OF THE 2013 BOOK SALE

We collected about 7,000 books not only from our congregation. At least 60% came from Tom and Emily Collins who had been being given books by their contacts over the year. This was at least twice the amount of books that we had even gotten before and the quality of the books was generally very good.

We were grateful for the new sign in front of the Church that went up 5 weeks early. About 50 signs were put up on poles around town a day before the first Saturday. Our sale information was also put up on social media and Craig's List of Events.

We had a lot of helpers to do a quick set up late on Sun. Apr. 28 after the Open House. This gave us a limited amount of time during the week to sort that huge number of books.

We had a great many customers on both Sat. May 4th and Sat May 11th. Books were also sold during Coffee Hour on Sunday May 5th.

At the end of the day on Sat. May 11th we helped the people from MORE THAN WORDS pack up over 2,000 books into their truck. MORE THAN WORDS is located at 376 Moody Street, Waltham. See the website at www.mtwyouth.org. Their hours are Tues. through Thurs. 11:30-9, Friday 11:30-10 and Sat. 11:30-6. This organization trains "at risk youth" to run businesses. The "business" on Moody St. is a bookshop/coffee shop. Stop in if you are in the vicinity!

Also about 600 preschool and early elementary books for went to the organization called Aklatan, a Philippine literacy program.

The Important Bottom Line!

We attracted many new people to the church building. We hope some come back.

We gave away just under 3,000 books to good causes.

And we collected \$1,907.86 to buy books in Spanish for the village of Flores!
