Our Gospel story this morning is about a journey. On the surface it's a short journey—it's only seven miles from Jerusalem to Emmaus. But if we go a little deeper and pay closer attention, it ends up that this journey is a long road trip. Because it's a faith journey that Jesus takes beside two grieving disciples, though they don't even recognize it's him until they break bread together. These disciples believed that Jesus was the Messiah, a prophet mighty in word and deed. Jesus was going to be the one to redeem Israel. Except he got handed over to the Romans, condemned to death, and crucified. Now the women in their group are talking about empty tombs and visions of angels, so clearly they've lost their minds! Cleopas and the other disciple hit the road, trying to make sense of what's happened or to escape the heartbreak as they walk with heavy hearts feeling defeated.


Laughable May 1, 2017

"OPEN HOUSE," Representative Jay Kaufman's Public Policy Forum

The 22nd season of "OPEN HOUSE," Representative Jay Kaufman's public policy forum, concludes with a 4-part series entitled "Democracy Demands Engagement." The four sessions will be on May 4, 18, and 25, and June 15 from 7-9 PM at Temple Isaiah, 55 Lincoln Street in Lexington. The series is cosponsored by the Lexington Interfaith Clergy Association.

The 2016 campaign sent shockwaves through the nation and world. Since Election Day, many of us asked "What now?" These forums will bring us together to ask this question, to think and learn together, and to explore steps to re-energize democracy and ourselves.

The May 4 session, "Challenging Times/Building Community," will invite us to identify what moves/concerns us and how to unite around these concerns. The second session on May 18, "Identifying and Overcoming Divisions," will allow us to look behind today's challenges to identify the systemic roots of our divisions and those who exploit them for political gain. On May 25, we will reflect on what it means to take "Values-Based/Moral Action." In the final session on June 15, we will look ahead to "What Now? Stand Up, Stand Tall, Stand Together."

Come work with us. Bring your kids or a friend. (LHS community service hours available.)




