## A NOTE FROM REV. KAREN GALE

Dear Pilgrim Folks,

"It takes love to hold on when you want to let go. It takes love to let go when you want to hold on."

— Kate McGahan

I found this quote recently and thought immediately how well it speaks to the Interim Time.

As I began my work with you all back in late summer, many of you told me that you are here at Pilgrim, and have stayed here at Pilgrim, because you love for the church and the people here. You love God and want to serve Jesus here. You love the kids and the elders and the in-betweeners here. And you love the openness to questioning one's faith in the midst of welcoming all people that you find at Pilgrim.

"It takes love to hold on when you want to let go."

Yes, this is true. You all have held on and hung in there at Pilgrim as we reckoned with the conflict that happened here and the hurts that were felt and the relationships that needed rebuilding. You all held on and together we have worked on what it means to serve God in this place.

Your showing up for worship faithfully each week, or as often as you could, rebuilt the Pilgrim community. Over time worship has become ever more joyful and thoughtful. We have reached for new things: learning a few spirituals, acting out the Holy Week drama on Palm Sunday, having our kids become more and more a part of worship.

Through worship, in Coffee Hour conversation, in Team meetings and Transition Team events, and in welcoming new people, the Pilgrim congregation has re-formed and rebuilt trust and hope. There is love here. Love for God, love for one another. From that essential foundation, we are standing together looking toward the future.

Yes, this is also true. In the Interim Time we have been questioning what we do as a congregation and why we do it. We look at how we are organized and how shifts in culture and society affect us. We open our eyes and ears to the community and ask how we fit in here. We let go to "how we always did it" and even beloved traditions in order to make room for new things and new ways of being.

This is hard work. And it is happening at Pilgrim. One meaningful change I have seen here lately is the openness to inviting social justice and advocacy groups to meet here. We offer our space and our beautiful building to those who need it. The Lexington Says Enough group organized here before the Gun Violence marches. Another group that seeks to keep in place the current Massachusetts protections for transgender folks also was welcomed to use Pilgrim's space.

In these ways Pilgrim creates community with others in Lexington. We offer hospitality. We offer one of our best resources, our space, and our openness to those who need space to work for justice and wholeness. It is mission in a new way.

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There are many things we are in the midst of looking at. We are thinking about how we elect Council, and how we invite youth into leadership. We are looking at how things get done around church and how we can invite new people into that work. We are re-imagining Children's Church and youth group. All of this is happening as the Transition Team finishes up the Local Church profile and we nominate a Search Team.

We continue to walk together in the Interim Time. We continue to build on the love that is here and open ourselves to the new ways God is calling us forward. Thank you for your faithfulness. I look forward to all that is to come.

I just received word from her this week that thieves broke into her home this last year and got away with everything of value to include cash, TV, laptop, phones and building materials for her new school. She wrote she was hesitant to share this for fear I would be angry and I immediately replied that I was relieved to know she and her family were well and safe. Our correspondence continued as she wrote that she believes things happen for reasons and she thanks 'him' in good times and bad while thanking God for her safety and that of her family and dear husband. She continued to share the severe cholera outbreak this year and how schools, churches, etc. were closed and that now they are making up the school days there as we are here with our snow this winter.

Through all this, she still is so very hopeful, thankful and <u>prays for us</u>. She is one truly amazing young lady as she continues to work with the children you have known through time without any pay and is one of the best teachers they have as her students skip a grade when entering the Government Schools after leaving Ng'Ombe's Community School.

I have received one donation for her that I will be sending to her later this month through a traveler to Zambia, but simply wanted you all to know and ask that you pray for her, her family and the safety of all.
