Sunday May 15 is **Confirmation Sunday**--an important and exciting day in the life of Pilgrim Church. *So what exactly is Confirmation?* A person is incorporated into the Christian Church through the Sacrament of Baptism. When we baptize an infant/young child, adults assume responsibility for their Christian nurture. The congregation (all of us!) promises to provide a supportive Christian community where the child may grow in faith. As young people approach adulthood, the local church offers the opportunity to learn our Christian faith more in-depth and gives them the chance to make a public witness to those baptismal vows once taken on their behalves. Confirmation is when we *affirm* our baptisms and *confirm* our desire to be adult members of the church. (And for those young people who haven't been baptized yet, this is the day when they are invited to become baptized as adult members of the church.)¹ It's such a great moment for local churches to celebrate!

On Sunday May 15, there will be seven students who will be confirmed here at Pilgrim Church: Sam, Taylor, Julia, Ted, Izzy, Fiona, and Eleanor. These students have been working hard since September (meeting twice a month and sometimes even more) to go through the UCC's *Affirming Faith* curriculum.

Here's some highlights of what they've been up to:

- Worshiped at Grace Chapel and Temple Emunah to experience another expression of Christianity and the Jewish faith, respectively
- Attended worship with us at Pilgrim Church (obviously!) to reflect on how we worship God
- Volunteered at Bristol Lodge and Lex Eat Together to serve those in need
- Unloaded pumpkins
- Lit an Advent Candle and helped to lead our Ash Wednesday service to begin Lent
- Read the Gospel of Luke (and were quizzed on its contents!)
- Wrote a "What Do I Believe?" paper to explore what they truly believe about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and Christian life
- Attended an Opening Retreat at the parsonage
- Will be attending a Closing Retreat at Grotonwood Camp & Conference Center this weekend. (At Grotonwood, we'll finish the *Affirming Faith* workbook and make Confirmation Stoles to depict where they are on their faith journeys using meaningful Christian symbols.)

To say that Lisa and I are proud of these Confirmands seems like an understatement, but we are *incredibly* proud of them! This group of young men and women have been a pleasure to journey with these past nine months. They are insightful, kind, and funny. Sam, Taylor, Julia, Ted, Izzy, Fiona, and Eleanor have asked many questions and explored complicated religious subjects with curious minds and open hearts. Honestly, Confirmation remains a favorite aspect of my ministry, thanks in large part to wonderful groups of young adults like these Pilgrims. We *all* will be blessed to see them in action on May 15. See you in church!

COMMUNITIES WITHOUT BORDERS & ZAMBIA

Please know that I will be traveling with CWB, Communities Without Borders again this summer, Pilgrim's seventh trip to support orphans and vulnerable children in communities outside Lusaka, the capitol of Zambia.

I have hesitated to make this public due to the changes within CWB in the last two years and yet feel I must see our friends there and do what little I possibly can for our two communities of the past, Ng'Ombe and Mandevu. Many of you who have traveled with us and supported our mission there will remember stories of Nina in Ng'Ombe as well as all the work we did there and in Mandevu through Mrs. Teresa Banda including electricity, new latrine, new exterior fencing/wall to say nothing of the teaching done by travelers of the past and participation in their graduation ceremonies. Pilgrim has a great deal to be proud of in both of these communities. You have all helped hundreds of children through these years.

This summer I will be traveling with CWB June 28th and returning on July 15th. I will be working and representing Pilgrim at the Garden Community and at a new school through CWB, Living Hope which is walking distance from out Guesthouse. We will be working/teaching in the schools and perhaps I will be involved in teacher workshops while there. When the other travelers go south to Livingston Falls, I will happily stay back to have extra time with the Ng'Ombe and Mandevu communities of the past that we have worked with and supported so strongly. I have been in touch with Nina on Ng'Ombe (She has a 'notebook' I sent her two years ago.) and have learned that she has not been paid this entire school year. The Mission Committee has kindly committed fund to support her work there and I will bring stories to you all upon my return. I will also spend time at Mandevu as well and Simon Kapeuta Middle School, also walking distance from the Guesthouse.

Please understand and know that I would have been more forthcoming about this Mission work except I really have not fully understood the particulars or felt I could safely assure others travel of clear and accurate information. I will be fine for I have been six other years and know my way around. Hopefully another year other Pilgrims will be able to make this trip once again.

I will be putting a box to collect mainly chalk, pencils and crayons at church with Council's permission later this month. I really do not have a great deal of room for things for I also have dolls to take to orphanages knit again my Pilgrims, the Girl Scouts, students at Bridge school and myself.

"LOVE THE STRANGER" - "WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?" PRESENTATION

TONIGHT - May 3 at 7:30 pm in Sacred Heart Parish Center, (Follen Road) there will be a presentation and discussion about two Biblical references, first the Hebrew Scripture's admonishment to "Love the stranger" and then the Christian Scripture's pressing question "Who is my neighbor?" The presenters will be Deborah K. Rambo, President of Boston Catholic Charities and Marjean A. Perhot, Director of Refugee Services, also from Catholic Charities. This is the fourth annual event of the "O'Donohoe Lecture Series," a memorial to honor the late Fr. James A. O'Donohoe, a longtime priest of Sacred Heart Parish, professor of Moral Theology and Canon Law at Boston College and well known medical ethicist in the Boston medical community.

The topic is a timely one in terms of present world conditions. Debates and discussions abound about the international response to this world-wide tragedy involving the immigration crisis and the plight of refugees around the world. Both groups have been thrust from their homes in their search for hope, safety and life throughout the world. Our own country is also struggling about our awareness of, and response to these moral tragedies regarding the plight of immigrants and refugees.

Deborah Rambo and Marjean Perhot are longtime social work professionals, working at Boston Catholic Charities. The agency is part of nation-wide network of Catholic Charities comprising the largest private network working with the U.S. State Department in the resettlement of refugees in the country. Catholic Charities also provides a range of services to support immigrants in their search for stability in their new environment.

While donations are accepted, there is no admission charge for the evening's activities. All are welcome to learn, question and participate in the discussions, which will be followed by a period of fellowship and hospitality.

On The Line looks back at the conflict of racial segregation in Boston's public schools in the 1960s and 1970s. The context and decisions that resulted in court-ordered busing, rather than the violence and tension that followed busing. Investigating the years prior to court-ordered busing helps to better understand current debates about segregation in public schools. As the United States becomes an increasingly diverse nation, it is particularly relevant for students to think about how people from different backgrounds build relationships based on mutual respect and shared understandings, and the role of schools in the endeavor.

OTL makes use of photo-montage recreations, interviews, original field footage and recordings, to examine the **METCO** integration experience through the lens of native Boston minority students who attended public school in the affluent suburb of Lexington, MA, along with counter-responses from suburban students and faculty directly impacted by the program long after the bus ride ended. Capturing historical context of its', founders, polarizing activists, teachers, parents and champions of the movement.
