On Sunday November 16—Consecration Sunday, we will formally conclude our 2015 Stewardship Campaign. By then, you will have heard from Susan Bennett, Michael Scott-Morton, Mike Clark, and Suzanne Abair about why they pledge and what Pilgrim Church means to them.

In Stewardship Sermons, I tend to focus on our community, on the wonderful ministries we undertake together and the Biblical calls to give. Like many of you, I also pledge to Pilgrim Church. I do so because our congregation means a great deal to me. I see how we enact God's love and fuse our Christian faith with our lives, and I can't help but give back as a way to be grateful to God. I truly remain thankful to be your pastor three and a half years after I began this holy work with you.

Church work is always interesting. Sometimes things happen on a small scale at Pilgrim and the wider congregation may not see the diverse ways we are the church together. One of my favorite parts of ministry is teaching. Whether it's Bible Study, Adult Ed classes, or Confirmation—we debate and question and learn and laugh, a lot. Sometimes I come to visit you in your homes or in the hospital and we talk about how you're doing and sometimes we talk about God. These holy conversations in small groups and with you one-on-one are remarkable to hear. When one of us gets sick and needs a meal or a ride, our Care Angels provide support. Before Jill left as our Interim CE Director, she couldn't believe that she was able to find Church School teachers for the entire year. Meaningful mission work happens as close as here in Lexington and as far as Honduras and Zambia. Church Council and Committees are dreaming and setting goals and moving along with various projects and initiatives. Pilgrim is a special church where we grow in our Christian faiths and support one another on our spiritual journeys.

We often speak in the church world of having a balcony view. That sometimes we need to go up to the balcony to get the lay of the land, to get far enough above the fray of daily congregational life to recognize patterns. What do I see when I try to have a balcony view?

Sometimes I see individuals and families who come to church on Sundays or midweek for meetings and adult education offerings and various church events—and people seem grounded and joyful. Other times, I see individuals and families who seem overburdened, stressed, and simply seeking peace in the midst of chaos. The beauty of church is that we have a place for joy and sorrow. We follow in the Way of Jesus—from his birth to his life and ministry, to his death and resurrection. We can identify with all the ups and downs Jesus and his followers experienced because we go through it too. There is so much comfort in enduring the stages of our lives together. Inevitably, from the balcony I see all that we have accomplished and the areas where we are a work in progress as a congregation, as it should be!

I appreciate that we consecrate our pledges around Thanksgiving in the United Church of Christ. It's wonderful to seamlessly connect our gratitude in this season to our gifts to God's Church. It's inspiring to give thanks to God for Pilgrim Congregational Church United Church of Christ and for fellow Pilgrims who stand beside us in all our seasons of life.

This November, let's consider all the ways we are the Church at Pilgrim, especially the small moments we experience where we see our congregation bringing forth a little more light and love into our world. For it's often those little acts of compassion and kindness that make a real impact in the end. Grace and Peace.

LICA THANKSGIVING SERVICE TUESDAY NOVEMBER 25, 7:30 PM AT HANCOCK UCC

All are invited to join the Lexington Interfaith Clergy Association (LICA) in our annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Worship Service to be held Tuesday, November 25th, at 7:30 pm at Hancock United Church of Christ, on the Green. Refreshments and conversation will follow the service. "Our Interfaith Service is a tradition of several decades," said Rabbi Jill Perlman of Temple Isaiah and a Co-President of LICA. "It is always inspiring to see Christians and Jews, Unitarians and Muslims, Hindus and members of other faith traditions giving thanks for the blessings of life."

The 2014 service will remember and celebrate more than fifty years of cooperation and shared service to the entire community. Service planner Rev. Paul Shupe of Hancock Church explains, "Respect and shared endeavor among gatherings of people of different faiths is not common in our world. Far too often mistrust and enmity prevail. But the faith communities of Lexington have a long and honorable history of giving thanks for the faith of others, and for working together to learn, to grow, and ease human suffering."

The service will include readings from many traditions attesting to the goodness of being open to others, stories of shared sacred work that has occurred over the decades, and celebration of ongoing efforts. Such efforts include an Interfaith Garden which provides organic produce for hungry families, as well as the Lift Up Lexington response to families in transition. We will also celebrate the rich community found among the clergy through their association with one another. An interfaith choir will sing, and at evening's end we'll eat and share good fellowship one with another.

All are invited to attend, whether you are participating in a faith community or not. The service can be watched live on Lexington cable television: Comcast channel 8, or RCN channel 3, or Verizon Channel 3. But Copenhaver argues that Jesus is the ultimate Questioner and asks far more questions than he answers in the Gospels. The chapters contain questions about longing, compassion, identity, faith and doubt, worry, the reach of love, healing, abundance, who Jesus is, and the cross. Copenhaver also writes about the questions Jesus does answer and questions from the Risen Christ.

Jesus is the Question will provide a wonderful chance for us to explore these important, timeless questions of our Christian faith together during the holy season of Advent. I hope to see you on December 10, and happy reading in the meantime!

For some time, there has been talk that our narthex needs attention. Well, I am pleased to tell you that your Membership Committee has begun actively working on this. I am also pleased to announce that the F&A committee recently voted \$8,000.00 from our church's Memorial Funds to help get this project off the ground. Below is a sneak preview of our thinking.

First and foremost, the narthex really sets the tone of who we are as a church. When people open our front doors on Sunday morning, this is the space that helps form first impressions. Therefore, the area needs to be bright, open, and friendly—a place where people can meet and greet one another, a place where they can obtain information as to who we are, and a place where they can easily learn about upcoming events. There should be comfortable seating, and the area should always look neat and organized to be as welcoming as possible.

Above all, Pilgrim needs to send the message that we are up to date and with the times. Thus, we are investigating the use of a flat screen monitor as one device to tell our story and announce upcoming events. New lighting is being researched as well as methods to hang framed pictures that can be easily changed throughout the year. This will provide the opportunity to display updated artwork from our children and youth and some of the beautiful photos from our website.

Times have changed—and they will continue to do so. The younger generation has less interest in attending traditional, old style churches that their grandparents worshiped in. Young people have been well schooled that they either stay abreast of new technology and practices, or they will be replaced by those who have. Vibrant churches must reach people where they are and be relevant in today's world. As a Founding Member of Pilgrim Church, I welcome change because it speaks directly to the first line in our church Mission Statement which says, "A welcoming home to all spiritual seekers." Stay tuned—our Committee will be sharing more information as we develop it.

LEXINGTON INTERFAITH GARDEN

A Ton of Food.....Really

There was great excitement at the Interfaith Garden on Saturday, October 25th. This summer we raised ONE TON of food for the Lexington Food Pantry...2006 pounds of fresh vegetables and fruits, to be more exact. To put that in perspective, in our first year we raised 995 pounds. Thanks to the Equipping the Saints Fund and willing volunteers, Pilgrim is part of that success. This summer Pilgrim sent volunteers to the garden on 14 days. Each of the twelve congregations contributes to the expense of the seeds, water, and equipment. Carla Fortmann, our very able head gardener, teaches us and oversees the planting, tending, and harvesting of the crops. She is the ultimate volunteer.

Thanks to this year's volunteers, we only needed to call on substitutes from other congregations a few times to fill our quota of two volunteers for each day. Pilgrim volunteers for this summer were Christina Sym, Mary Mackie, Sandy Gardiner, Duncan Todd, Son-Mey Chiu, Jeanne DeSanto, Peter DeSanto, and Barbara Munkres. An interesting story from the garden this year: a substitute, Matthew Pronchick, enjoyed the garden so much that he invited a few friends to come. Before long he had his own "congregation" called Matthew's Circle of Friends.

If all this sounds like fun, it is, though perhaps not so much on a drizzly Saturday morning in October with the temperature in the 40's. Even then, there are no complaints and work continues. The garden closes for the year on Saturday, November 1 and perhaps a few more pounds will be added to our harvest.
