A NOTE FROM KAREN GALE

Dear Pilgrim folks,

I've been reflecting on the unusual cluster of holidays we are marking this October. This coming weekend we mark Columbus Day which is now called Indigenous Peoples Day in many communities. The tension between these two vibrates still: our history in this nation as we saw it for centuries—Manifest Destiny and the primacy of Western values—and the quite recent recognition of the earlier history of First Nations peoples who lived here before colonists and treasure seekers arrived.

How do we hold these two histories together and understand the collision of cultures, the legacy of war and genocide and the responsibility we have to future generations to "get it right" in our telling our nation's story? History is a tricky thing. We understand that history is usually written by the winners. But as Christians we tell a different story, a story of those on the margins, the underclass, the ones Jesus hung out with. How do we speak of indigenous people in our telling of history to our children, and in looking at the celebrations happening this weekend?

Later in the month in the church calendar we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Martin Luther's act of "ecclesiastical disobedience" changed the face of Christianity forever. Luther never wanted to split the church. He just wanted reforms in the church. But by nailing his complaints to the cathedral door he cracked the church apart and we Protestants have been splintering and splitting ever since. So is our 500th anniversary a celebration of speaking up about our faith or is it an acknowledgement of all the changes that have happened including the forming of our own UCC tradition? Or is it a reminder of the saying that "God has yet more truth and light to break forth from God's holy Word."

Finally, we celebrate Halloween, a time for imaginations running free, trying on new identities if just for one night, and a major indulgence in candy. Halloween was historically considered a time of year when the barrier between earth and the beyond, the afterlife, was thin. It was a time when the Spirit and the spirits of those we loved and lost came close to us. Then as the new day dawned, we celebrated All Saints' Day and remembered and honored those people. Who are you remembering this year?

I wish you an interesting and reflective October. Think about the histories you have inherited from your family, your community, our nation and Pilgrim church. Consider what you celebrate and why. And, of course, put aside some time to enjoy the celebrations.

For God is present in our deliberation and our openness to new ideas. And God is present in our joy and our celebration.

ADULT EDUCATION SERIES - SAVE THE DATES!

Despite her conversion from Orthodox Judaism to Christianity, Lauren Winner finds that her life is still shaped by the spiritual essences of Judaism- rich traditions and religious practices that she can't leave behind. In *Mudhouse Sabbath*, Winner illuminates eleven spiritual practices that can transform the way we view the world, and God. Whether discussing her own prayer life, the spirituality of candle-lighting, or the differences between the Jewish Sabbath and a Sunday spent at the Mudhouse, her favorite coffee shop, Winner writes with appealing honesty and rare insight.

A CALL FOR ALTAR FLOWERS

Each week, a member of the congregation donates the altar flowers for Sunday's church service. Many people choose a date to give the flowers that is, for them, a special time of celebration or remembrance. Our church secretary, Diane Blair, keeps the list of donors and makes the arrangements with Wilson Farms for the delivery of the flowers.

Usually, the donors take the flowers home after the service. Alternatively, the flowers can be left to be delivered to a homebound friend.

The cost of the flowers is a very reasonable \$40; to pay for them, make a check out to Pilgrim Church with "altar flowers" on the memo line, and either put it in the offering plate or mail it to the church. Giving flowers is a wonderful way to contribute to the beauty of our church service.

HEARING DEVICES AVAILABLE

If the resonant acoustics of our sanctuary sometimes make it difficult for you to understand the spoken word, cheer up—help is available. We now have some new and improved individual hearing devices that work wonderfully well. Each consists of a little wireless receiver that is tuned to our sound system, with a cord and an ear plug. The sound is adjustable according to personal preference. You can find them in a basket on the name tag table in the narthex.



If you borrow one for use during the service, please be sure to return it at the end of the service, and to TURN IT OFF. (Otherwise, the battery runs out quickly.)
