A NOTE FROM KAREN GALE

Dear Pilgrim folks,

I took a walk during my lunch the other day. I walked from the church, around the corner onto Revere and ended up at Parker Meadow, a piece of conservation land in Lexington. It is a lovely walk into a piece of nature. But it wasn't what I expected. I imagined a meadow, perhaps the stereotyped, grassy rise with wildflowers and a breeze rippling the grasses.

Parker Meadow instead is a walk, often boardwalk, under shade trees, around stands of tall brush with patchy sun on the ground, and bordering a large pond. It was clear to me that over time this meadow has changed from open grassland, probably forage for livestock at one point, and is in the midst of a transformation to a young woodland and wetland.

Parker Meadow is wonderful. It is just not the meadow of my imagination and it took me a moment to reset. I had to move from anticipation of what I thought I would find to appreciation of what was actually there.

This process of resetting can happen during the interim journey as well. We can tend to come to church anticipating one thing based on our past, or our experiences, or our unfilled wants. We arrive only to be disappointed when that vision is not reality. There aren't as many people in the pews as we remember. Or we are moving in a different direction with our mission money and effort than we used to. Or an old tradition has faded. Or some committees have died off.


Sometimes this can blind us to what is, and leave us unable to appreciate what we find in our particularly community of faith now. What is life giving at Pilgrim right now? What people bring joy to worship and in their service? Where can we see God doing a new thing, a different thing, a reimagined thing? How do we feel uplifted and supported at Pilgrim? How does the church enable us to go out and do God's work?

I invite you in the months ahead into the spiritual practice of resetting. Reset your expectations. Reset your ideas of what is "good ministry" or a "good church" or a "good number of members" and look around at what is present in reality. Where do you see hope and love and light at Pilgrim? I see a lot of it and will keep reflecting it back to you as we journey together in this transition time.

This Quarter, we will be spending September 10th through November 19th with the stories from Genesis to Exodus. We will spend a few weeks on different aspects of one story, engaging in hand's on activities that help us to better understand the message of our stories of faith. Our plans for the coming Sundays are as follows:

On the 17th, we will divide up into the age groups and read and discuss the creation story again and watch the video that comes through the Holy Moly and Connect Curricula. Our K-2nd group will get to color in their own creation story books. Our older two groups will join together to read the story straight from their Connect Bible and watch a video to help guide the discussion. As time allows, they will use fabric markers on fabric blocks to create a Creation Quilt.

On the 24th, we will continue our theme of enjoying creation and create leaf coasters. These might make great gifts for Christmas so I do not want to ruin the surprise! While we won't review the creation story on this day, it will be a light day and give us a chance to focus on being the creator's that God created us to be.

On October 1st, we will begin to study Noah's Ark. We will use science and a study of density to make rainbows, discuss the rainbow as a symbol in Noah's Story, and what we think it means in the world today. It is also Communion Sunday, a special one, too. We will be celebrating World Communion Sunday as a church. As a reminder, Children's Church begins downstairs and we will join the adults in worship in a worldly way when that time comes.

Watch out for next month, we will be delving deeper into the Hebrew Bible and explore the stories that lead up to Exodus. Keep an eye out for details, if anything makes you curious do not hesitate to ask.

ADULT EDUCATION SERIES - SAVE THE DATES!

Despite her conversion from Orthodox Judaism to Christianity, Lauren Winner finds that her life is still shaped by the spiritual essences of Judaism-rich traditions and religious practices that she can't leave behind. In *Mudhouse Sabbath*, Winner illuminates eleven spiritual practices that can transform the way we view the world, and God. Whether discussing her own prayer life, the spirituality of candle-lighting, or the differences between the Jewish Sabbath and a Sunday spent at the Mudhouse, her favorite coffee shop, Winner writes with appealing honesty and rare insight.

Devin Shmueli, our Director of Christian Education, will explore five different spiritual practices, customs, and traditions identified in the book. 
